









D-DAY 79TH ANNIVERSARY: BRITISH NORMANDY MEMORIAL HOSTS INTERNATIONAL CEREMONY FOR FIRST TIME

The British Normandy Memorial, which officially opened in June 2021, will for the first time play host to the annual International Ceremony marking the 79th anniversary of D-Day. The Memorial remembers the 22,442 servicemen and women from 38 different countries who died under British command on D-Day and during the Battle of Normandy in the summer of 1944.





Organised by the *Comité du Débarquement*, the International Ceremony hosts representatives from the nine principal Allied nations (Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, Great Britain, the Netherlands, Poland, Norway and the United States of America) as well as Germany.

The service includes speeches from these representatives, the raising of each Allied flag in turn, and music from a French military band.

Last year, the Ceremony took place in Bernières-sur-Mer in the Canadian sector.





Stan Ford, Normandy Veteran and Memorial Ambassador, said:

"I am delighted that this year the international ceremony is being held at the British Normandy Memorial. I look forward to taking part in the ceremony, paying tribute to the many thousands of servicemen and women who died under British command, and those from the other Allied Nations and Germany. It will be a truly poignant moment to remember and reflect together surrounded by the engraved names of those who made the ultimate sacrifice for our freedom."



This year's anniversary will also be the first time that the Veterans, families of the fallen and many dignitaries will have the opportunity to see the newest addition to the Memorial site: The Queen Elizabeth II Avenue.

The planting of 70 trees, a gift offered by President Macron for Her Majesty the Queen's Platinum Jubilee last June, took place on Wednesday 11 January at the site of the British Normandy Memorial.

The gift now stands as a marker of the Queen's remarkable reign, in her memory, and as a sign of the significant relationship between the UK and France.

The service includes speeches from the representatives, the raising of each Allied flag in

turn, and music from a French military band.

A group of British Battle of Normandy Veterans are expected to attend the service. They will be joined by a group of up to 50 US Veterans who have been brought to Normandy

with the Best Defense Foundation.

What Was D-Day?

The D-Day landings in Normandy on 6th June 1944 marked the beginning of the Allied assault against the Nazi occupiers in western Europe. From first light on 6th June, forces comprising British, US, Canadian, French and other nationalities landed across a beachhead stretching for over 60 miles along the Normandy coastline on five beaches: Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno, and Sword (from west to east). More than 180,000 men landed that day on the beaches and from the air, while more than 7,000 ships were involved in the bombardment and bringing men and supplies ashore.

The British Normandy Memorial

The British Normandy Memorial stands on a hillside in Ver-sur-Mer above Gold Beach in Normandy, a place where history was shaped. On the columns of the Memorial the names of 22,442 servicemen and women from 38 nationalities who lost their lives on D-Day and during the Battle of Normandy are inscribed. The site of the Memorial was selected by Normandy Veterans during a consultation process in April 2017. It was formally opened on 6 June 2021 by the then Prince Charles, Prince of Wales, as Royal Patron of the Normandy Memorial Trust.

Key facts about the Memorial:

- 50 acres (20 hectares) size of Memorial site.
- 700m distance from Gold Beach.
- 38m height above sea level.
- 4,700 tonnes amount of stone used to construct the Memorial.
- 7.6m height of walls of Memorial Courtyard, with the names of the 1,746 who died on D-Day itself engraved on the walls.
- 160 number of pillars on which the remaining names are cut in chronological order (by day).
- The youngest servicemen to be included on the Memorial are 16 years old whilst the oldest is 64.
- The remains of the Mont Fleurie Battery, a German artillery bunker borders the site to the east, where CSM Stan Hollis VC began the action that saw him awarded the only Victoria Cross of D-Day.

CWGC Bayeux War Cemetery

Bayeux War Cemetery is the largest Second World War Commonwealth cemetery in France. The cemetery contains 4,648 burials mainly from Commonwealth forces who died during D-Day and liberation of Normandy. There are also a further 466 graves of German soldiers. Opposite the cemetery is the Bayeux memorial which commemorates more than 1,800 casualties of the Commonwealth Forces who died in Normandy and have no known grave.

For almost 80 years on 6 June veterans and their families have returned to honour their comrades during the commemorative events held in the cemetery. Bayeux War Cemetery has been and remains the focal point of remembrance for those who fought and died during the Normandy campaign. The cemetery and memorial were built and are still maintained today by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.
